

A Neonatal Nurses Association (NNA) Guide Getting started with publishing

Video series

This brief guide aims to give you some tips and advice on getting your work published, for those who are new to this area, or need some support getting started. Please refer to the key points in this guide at the same time as watching the brief videos that have been developed. Examples of the different types of paper are also given. The content of this series of videos is as follows:

VIDEO 1- Supporting you to publish

The NNA believe it is important to support our members and our body of neonatal nurses / allied health professionals (AHPs) to develop professionally, progress in their roles and showcase good practice. Publishing is one ideal way of achieving these aims. We also recognise that publishing, particularly if you are a student or a new staff nurse / AHP, can be daunting and that support is required to help and guide you appropriately. VIDEO 2- Writing a Discussion paper

A discussion paper is also sometimes called a 'review paper' and is an article &/or commentary on a chosen topic of interest and relevance to your audience. Consider a specific angle that is of current interest or requiring attention due to lack of available literature or knowledge. In addition, the paper needs to have international relevance, it needs to be supported by literature in line with evidence-based principles and it needs to be applied to practice. Take a look at the journal and see how these types of papers are structured and written. Commonly, discussion papers have the following sections:

- ✓ **Abstract** a summary of the whole paper
- ✓ **Introduction** sets the scene- what is the paper about?
- ✓ **Background** the evidence-based context /supporting literature- what else is written on the topic?
- ✓ **Aims-** what will the reader gain from reading the paper?
- ✓ **Main body of the paper-** use sub-titles to divide up the key themes / areas of discussion.
- ✓ Recommendations for practice Or Implications for practice how can the key points be used in your practice?
- ✓ Conclusion a concise summary

VIDEO 3- Writing a research paper or quality improvement (QI) project

These papers are write-ups of a study or project that you have completed, to disseminate the findings / outcomes. Commonly, research studies / QI reports papers have the following sections:

- ✓ **Abstract -** a summary of the whole study / project
- ✓ **Introduction -** sets the scene- what is the study/project about?
- ✓ **Background** the evidence-based context /supporting literature- what else has been researched on the topic / area?
- ✓ Aims / Research question what does your study / project set out to achieve and ask?
- ✓ Design / methodology the research design, underpinning framework / paradigm and methods used.

- ✓ Analysis how was the data managed / handled?
- ✓ Results / Findings what was found? Objective reporting of the findings.
- ✓ **Discussion** what are the wider implications / issues for further discussion that arose from the findings? This section includes the study limitations.
- ✓ **Recommendations for practice** –key points for practice?
- ✓ Conclusion a concise summary.

VIDEO 4- Writing a case study /a reflection on practice

A case study paper is a summary of the care of a specific case which is of interest or perhaps novel, where key learning points emerge. These papers start by describing the case and then summarising important areas of learning to apply to practice. The video talks you through some. There are two examples below:

GENERAL GUIDANCE FOR PUBLISHING IN THE JNN

Consider the following points:

- o Who is your audience? ...
- o Think your ideas over ...
- o Choose your topic / focus....
- o Consider / decide what type of paper it is you want to write ...
- o Keep it simple. ...
- Access and read the JNN guidelines for authors at....

- Note what sections are recommended, the suggested word count, any specific journal requirements and the referencing procedure.
- Find some protected time to write ...
- Pay attention to your writing style, consistent with the type of paper you are writing ...
- Write and edit later; ensure you proof-read carefully or ask someone else to
